
### Geocaching 101




## What is Geocaching?

Geocaching is an outdoor recreational activity, played all over the world. Participants use a Global Positioning System (GPS) receiver or mobile device and other navigational techniques to hide and seek containers, called geocaches or caches, at specific locations marked by coordinates. Kind of like hide and seek or a scavenger hunt.

## The Point of Geocaching

- Gets people participating in outdoor activities.
- Makes walks and hikes more fun for both children and adults.
- Promotes exploration of new areas.
- Can lead to a fun adventure.
- Is fun and rewarding.







#### How Geocaching Works as a Seeker

- 1. Get Coordinates of a Cache
- 2. Using GPS enter the coordinates
- 3. Make your way to the coordinates
- 4. Find the cache
- 5. Write your name in the log book

- 6. Trade Items, take item, give item. No item. Depends on the hider's instructions.
- 7. Put cache back where and how you found it
- 8. Do it again!

### How to get started.

- Need to have a desire to explore.
- Find a place such as geocaching.com that has geocache locations posted.
- Make sure you have all necessary equipment
- Go out there and have fun!

### Items - What to trade and what not to trade

#### Items that should NOT be placed in a cache:

- Illegal material
- Dangerous material, such as explosives, ammunition, lighters, knives, drugs, or alcohol
- Edible or scented items
- Items that can melt, such as crayons or lip balm
- Items that can expand in the cold, such as liquids

#### Items Should Be:

- Hold little to no monetary value
- Appropriate for all ages
- Random
- Not Controversial









If you know the size of geocache keep that in mind when choosing an item to give. Some smaller caches, especially micros will not contain items.

- Bug Spray
- Boots
- Sunscreen
- Food and Water
- Compass
- Hat


- Long Pants

Geocaching with Geocaching.com

#### Guidelines

- Be aware of the general area the location is and obey all laws
  - ex. Some parks close after sunset or at a certain time
  - Avoid going on private land unless you have permission
- Leave no trace
  - Don't leave trash, avoid disturbing natural areas
- Be respectful of the cache and other players.



### Safety

- Don't trespass
- Research the general area ahead of time.
  - Try to plan for parking and hiking route.
  - Know when hunting is occurring while in areas hunting is allowed
- Don't put yourself in dangerous situations while looking for a cache
  - Going far off a trail at an area you're not familiar with.
  - Crossing a deep stream

# Tips and Tricks for Finding Caches

- Think creatively; some caches are disguised or require you to solve a puzzle.
- Look for things out of place.
- Read the hints if they're available.
- Use your hands, not just your eyes.
- Be patient!
- Never doubt a spot, it could be under the 10th rock you turn over!

# Creating and Hiding Your Own Caches



- First, find some geocaches to get ideas on what is most fun for players.
- Pick a container
  - Generally want it waterproof. Come in various sizes, shapes, and colors.
- Choose locations wisely
- Check all laws
  - Certain areas prohibit or require permits for placing caches
- Ask permission before placing it at private land and business.
- Don't place your cache too close to other caches.
- Don't bury a cache.
- Hide cache and publish it somewhere people can see it.
