

IOWA'S FISHING REGULATIONS

Below are guidelines that will be helpful when you fish Iowa. However, it is not a complete list of all fishing regulations and always be sure laws haven't changed. For more information, visit www.iowadnr.gov or contact the DNR Central Office in Des Moines at 515-725-8200.

- STREAM CLASSIFICATION.** Before you plan your trip, it is important to understand how trout waters are classified in Iowa. The trout management in Iowa divides trout fisheries into the three categories listed below. Please read each definition to gain an understanding of which stream segments contain catchable trout or are open to the public.
 - CATCHABLE STOCKED STREAMS** are open to the public and stocked regularly with catchable-sized trout that measure 10 to 12 inches in length and weigh between one-half and one pound.
 - RESTRICTIVE REGULATION (RR) STREAMS** are open to the public and can only be fished using artificial lures. Many have a catch-and-release regulation for all trout. There are no RR Streams located in Fayette County.
 - WILD TROUT WATER** is open to the public and managed under statewide regulations. However, no stocking occurs.
- IOWA'S TROUT SEASON.** Iowa's trout season differs from Minnesota, Wisconsin & Illinois in that the state offers continuous year-round fishing for brook, brown and rainbow trout.
- DAILY BAG LIMIT** The daily bag limit for trout is five and the possession limit is 10.
- FISHING LICENSE & TROUT FEE.** Anglers who fish for trout are required to pay the trout fee in addition to an Iowa fishing license. Both expire each year in January. However, children under 16 years of age may fish for free and possess trout if they fish with a licensed adult who has paid the current trout fee and they limit their combined catch to the daily limit of five trout. If young anglers want to fish for and keep their own limit of trout, they only need to purchase the trout fee.

WELCOME TO IOWA'S TROUT COUNTRY



Fayette County is home to 10 spring-fed creeks that comprise over 14 miles of fishable water. Located in the heart of Iowa's trout region, Fayette County's tranquil landscape is home to some of the most popular trout fishing destinations in Iowa. Anglers are attracted to this area for its high concentration of prime trout waters, fish counts, trout stocking plants and year-round opportunities to catch brook, brown and rainbow trout. Iowa DNR efforts have also contributed to making this region of the state a world-class trout fishery. On average, the Iowa DNR stocks approximately 31,000 catchable-size rainbow trout into catchable stocked streams within Fayette County from April 1 - October 31. In addition, excess brood trout, or adult trout that typically measure between 14 and 24 inches in length and weigh anywhere from two to eight pounds, are released into streams each year. In addition to stocked fish, all Fayette County stocked streams also have naturally reproducing brown trout for anglers to catch. Dutton Springs Creek, in addition to brown trout, also has naturally reproducing brook trout. TROUT FISHING ON PUBLIC & PRIVATE LAND



Anglers may fish in waters found on public land such as Iowa State Forests, Parks, and Wildlife Management Areas. In the Driftless region, many of the trout streams flow through private land. Furthermore, in Iowa, the landowner also owns the streambed. So even if the stream is accessible from public access points, anglers still need permission to fish private property. On private property, two systems allow the opportunity for public fishing.


- **THE "HANDSHAKE AGREEMENT"** is simply a verbal agreement between the landowner and the state, allowing public fishing. On private property where a verbal agreement is in place, one will frequently see white signs which read, 'Private Property. Public Fishing Only.' Wooden ladder stiles, allowing one to easily cross over a fence, may also be present. However, the owner ultimately decides if these indicators to public fishing are allowed on the property.
- The second system is the **ANGLER CONSERVATION EASEMENT** that allows public fishing, fish stocking by the DNR, and habitat improvement on the stream. The easement consists of a corridor of 75 feet on both sides of the center line of the stream; therefore, the corridor moves as the stream changes direction. This allows continual access to the stream. Gray or dark blue signs reading 'Open for Public Fishing - Stream Easement Area' have been posted on private property where an easement is present.
- **IF IN DOUBT**, and neither sign is present, stay out or ask the landowner for permission. There are plenty of fishing opportunities in the region.

DUTTON SPRINGS CREEK



LENGTH & TROUT: 0.25 mile stream with Brook Trout
DESCRIPTION: Dutton's Cave County Park is a 46-acre public area located 3.5 miles northeast of West Union. A large cave at the base of the park's 50-foot vertical limestone wall serves as both the park's main attraction and the origin of Dutton Springs Creek, which was discovered by Lorenzo Dutton in 1848. From the cave, a mowed path follows the stream segment 0.27 miles through a heavily wooded ravine and past both picnic and playground facilities. The spring run has limited reproduction of native brook trout and supplemental stocking occurs as needed. While trout population numbers are low, anglers can delight in pursuing Iowa's only surviving native brook trout, which are periodically stocked from South Pine Creek in Winneshek County. A campground with water, primitive sites, and two electric-hookup sites is located above the cave and is accessed by gravel road. The cave itself, and the hiking trail between the campground and cave are now closed in order to prevent people from accidentally spreading White-Nose Syndrome, a fungal disease that decimates North American bat populations.

GLOVERS CREEK AND WEST OTTER CREEK (ECHO VALLEY STATE PARK)



MOST VISITED TROUT STREAM IN FAYETTE COUNTY

LENGTH & TROUT: 3.6 mile stream with Brown & Rainbow Trout
DESCRIPTION: Echo Valley State Park located east of West Union is a beautiful natural area that includes two trout streams running through the park: Glovers and Otter Creek. Originally built by the Civilian Conservation Corps in the 1930's, the park contains many hand-built historical structures such as a dam, keystone archway, lime kiln, and shelter house. The historical park also features a 2.5-mile long gravel based trail known as the Jensen Trail that runs parallel to and provides access along Otter Creek. Glovers is stocked weekly April through October with catchable 10-12 inch rainbow trout, but Otter Creek gets too warm for stocking in July and August. Both streams offer many easy access points to the stream for anglers with limited mobility and are set within a beautiful limestone bluff backdrop. Stream-side paths (BYOT) will draw more adventurous anglers toward less-fished, even more scenic areas. Anglers may use a variety of baits to fish the deeper holes, as the occasional trout exceeding 20 inches may be caught. On warmer afternoons and early mornings, fish can be seen rising to hatches of stoneflies, midges, mayflies.

BEAR CREEK



LENGTH & TROUT: 1.2 mile stream with Rainbow and Brown Trout
DESCRIPTION: Located 6 miles southeast of Fayette, Bear Creek is a fairly large stream that is accessible by completing a 1/2 mile downhill walk. Once you arrive at the stream, you find yourself immersed in a beautiful valley with clear water and steep wooded ridges on either side. Bear Creek is not a coldwater stream and does not support trout populations most summers. However, it is stocked weekly in April, May, June, September and October with catchable 10-12 inch rainbow trout. Lots of chubs, assorted panfish, and an occasional brown trout may also be caught. Access to the stream at certain times of the year may be difficult due to overgrown vegetation making hip or chest waders preferred.

BRUSH CREEK



LENGTH & TROUT: 1.6 mile stream with Brown Trout
DESCRIPTION: Brush Creek Canyon State Preserve exemplifies the dramatic landscape of a prominent ridge extending through northeast Iowa known as the Silurian Escarpment. Dedicated as a biological and geological state preserve in 1968, this 217-acre preserve features steep slopes and exposed bedrock formed by 150-foot-tall outcrops of Silurian dolomite. Access to this stream is challenging, as it is at the bottom of a steep valley, but is well worth the effort. This fishery contains deep pools and runs filled with stream-reared brown trout. MINK CREEK



LENGTH & TROUT: 0.9 mile stream with Brown & Rainbow Trout
DESCRIPTION: Mink Creek is a spring fed tributary of the Volga River that flows in a southeasterly direction as it winds through mowed pasture, farmland, and tree plantings. The accessible trout water is entirely on private property and is open to public fishing through landowner agreements. The mowed trail section between W51/Cedar Road to Bighorn Road provides anglers with the best fishing access. Although this is a warm-water stream, don't hesitate to check it out. A reproducing wild brown trout population is present. Mink Creek is also stocked weekly from April through October with catchable 10-12-inch rainbow trout.

GRANNIS CREEK

LENGTH & TROUT: 1.5 mile stream with Brown & Rainbow Trout
DESCRIPTION: Grannis Creek runs through both public and private property, where it is open to fishing only. It empties into the Volga River just a few short miles downstream of the Volga River State Recreation Area. Plenty of stream-reared brown trout in the 9 to 12-inch range await the angler, and a few fish over 15 inches may challenge the unwary. It is stocked weekly from April through October with catchable rainbow trout. Anglers will find a great deal of habitat improvements along the stream, so finding a good hole or bank hide to fish won't be a problem. Improvements to the stream's watershed include one mile of terraces, 18 sediment and water control basins, 3 grade stabilization structures and the installation of "lunker hides" for trout. Bank access along the MT sections of the stream is easy, while the BYOT section located between the Grannis Creek Wildlife Management Areas is challenging to access due to vegetation, undercut banks, 6-foot-high silt banks and deadfalls. For universal stream access, anglers can find a small paved sidewalk near the upstream parking lot along Grannis Road. Mayfly, midge, gnats, and caddis flies are common insects in these areas.

EAST OTTER CREEK



LENGTH & TROUT: 5.1 mile stream with Brown & Rainbow Trout
DESCRIPTION: The trout waters of Otter Creek start at the dramatic cliffs in Echo Valley State Park and run more than 9 miles to the town of Elgin. A fishable downstream section known as East Otter Creek is located 6 miles west of town at the intersection of Dove and Echo Valley Road. Although this river segment is considered a warm-water stream, 10-12 inch catchable rainbow trout are stocked weekly during the months of April, May, June, September and October. A popular fishing spot includes the easily accessible slow moving deep pool adjacent to the Echo Valley Road parking access. This location is easy to walk along and in an open enough space for fly-casting.

TURKEY RIVER



Turkey River

LENGTH & TROUT: River with Brown and Rainbow Trout
DESCRIPTION: The river flows across Fayette and Clayton Counties towards the Mississippi River. Much of the river features high-quality fishing opportunities, with over 74 species of fish documented in the watershed. When targeting trout, anglers should focus wherever cold water tributaries enter the river. The most popular trout fishing on the Turkey River occurs at the Big Spring Trout Hatchery. Here, anglers have access to trails along the river, a trout pond open for public fishing, and a kids fishing pond for young anglers 15 and under. Trout are stocked in the Turkey River weekly from April 1 through the end of October.

IOWA'S TROUT FAMILY

- Brook Trout** are native to Iowa and are recognized by two main characteristics: vivid white lines on the front or leading edge of the lower fins, and the top portion or back is covered with light wormy streaks or mottlings on a darker background called vermiculations.
- Brown Trout** are brown with silvery sides and obvious black spots outlined by orange coloration. They have a square tail, and a lower jaw that juts out ahead of their upper jaw. Males, during the breeding season, often exhibit vivid yellow to reddish-yellow colors along the belly region and a sharply hooked lower jaw.
- Rainbow Trout** are olive to greenish-blue over most of the upper body, fading to a silvery-white along the belly. They are most easily separated from the other trout species by the strikingly prominent pink-red horizontal stripe that extends down each side of the fish and the small black spots on the sides, back, dorsal and caudal fins.
