


SANDHILL CRANES & PRAIRIE CHICKENS BUS TRIP

NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA

March 26th – 28th, 2026

Deadline to register is February 12th, 2026



This trip is partnership with Benton County Conservation, Bremer County Conservation & Buchanan County Conservation

Each spring, more than 500,000 sandhill cranes gather in the Platte River Valley during their northward bound migration. Cranes have been making this annual migration for thousands of years and fossil beds in several parts of Nebraska contain remains of prehistoric cranes from 10 million years ago.

The Platte is a "staging" area where the cranes stop to rest and replenish energy reserves before continuing on to their nesting grounds in Canada, Alaska, and Siberia. It is the only major staging area on the sandhill cranes' northward migration. Approximately 80 percent of all sandhill cranes come to the Platte every spring. The concentration of cranes here is the greatest of anywhere in the world.

The Platte River region provides the combination of habitat components in close proximity to each other that the sandhill cranes need: crop fields with an abundant supply of food, wetlands and grasslands that provide critical nutrients, and secure roosting sites.

RAILROAD PRAIRIE CHICKEN & SANDHILL CRANE TOURS NORTH PLATTE, NEBRASKA

On Friday, we will make an early morning visit to the largest known Prairie Chicken Lek in Nebraska prior to sunrise and remain for about 3 hours enjoying the incredible sights and sounds of these amazing birds as they practice and perform their showy mating rituals. These birds will give it their all, fiercely defending their small, but mighty territory to impress on-looking females.

Friday evening we will head out for the opportunity to view sandhill cranes as they converge onto the river for their night's roost. Saturday morning, we will return to the blind to along the Platte River and watch as the sandhills greet the light of a new day and head out to feed.

All birding tours will be lead by guides from Dusty Trails, LLC. Viewing blinds are largely enclosed, but not heated so please dress appropriately as you will be walking to the viewing areas where it may be wet and marshy and will be in the blinds for a couple of hours. Binoculars are also available to use, but supplies are limited. We encourage you to bring your own viewing equipment. Note: If you plan to do some photography, some photographers who have attended these tours suggest you bring your long lens.



GOLDEN SPIKE TOWER

Golden Spike Tower overlooks the World's Largest Classification Rail Yard. From the open-air observation deck, hear the sounds of locomotives powering up and down as they enter or leave the diesel shop, horns blowing and the screech of rail cars sliding down the classification hump. One floor higher is a fully enclosed deck with a 360° view of the activity in Bailey Yard with retired railroad employees to explain what is taking place below and their experiences of working for the Union Pacific Railroad.



ALONG THE WAY



On Thursday afternoon We will be visiting The Old Market in Omaha, NE, where we can enjoy lunch, shopping, and various activities the area provides. On our return home on Saturday, we will stop by the Crane Trust Nature & Visitor Center to learn about sandhill crane migration, purchase souvenirs, and explore the surroundings.
